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WHAT'S ON IN APRIL

Easter Services

FROM THE VICAR

Dear Friends

It has happened! By the time you read this it will be old news, but now as I write, in the middle of March, it is thrillingly exciting.

Today I smelt cut grass for the first time this year.

I am writing on one of those lovely March days when I didn't need my gloves and my hand even hesitated over my coat for a moment. The sun is out, and although it isn't hot, there is the hint of warmth in the air. And there I was, walking past a front garden when I smelt it; the smell of spring; that warm, sweet smell which conclusively says, winter is ending and something new is starting. The lawn mower is out and a new season is here.

Hopefully, by the time you are reading this, spring will be well underway, but today it is still something promised, something for the future - it is hinted at, but not yet arrived.

Whoever it was that chose to have Lent and Easter at this time of year knew what they were doing. When Lent began, back in the cold and dark of February, it was hard to believe that spring would ever come. Now, half way through, anticipation is rising. By the time Easter Day arrives on 5 April, it will be here.

And what is happening in nature provides a perfect backdrop to the story of Easter, as the darkness and cold of Jesus' tomb is transformed into the glory and warmth of resurrection. And this pattern of death and new life, which we see in the move from Winter to Spring, is God's pattern too.

Maybe you're searching to find God, but can't find him anywhere.

Maybe life still feels more like the February cold than the warmth of an April spring day.

However things are for you, know that God is in the resurrection business. The promise is there - spring will come, life will emerge, resurrection is at work.

COMMEMORATING THE FALLEN OF THE GREAT WAR APRIL 1915



9th April 1915: Alfred John Gurr, Private S2/018247, 63rd Depot Unit, 13th Division, Army Service Corps. A married man; family home at Trowswell Cottage, Goudhurst, and formerly in North Road. His peacetime job as a grocer's assistant, perhaps a deliveryman, may be what led him to become a driver in the ASC. Although prompt to volunteer after the outbreak of war, he never left England and died of scarlet fever and phthisis (a wasting disease) in a military isolation hospital at Aldershot, aged 33.



24th April 1915: Basil Edward Clarke, Private I7104, 7th Battalion, Canadian Infantry. A son of James Sanderson Clarke, Vicar of Goudhurst from 1864 to 1910. After working as a clerk in London, he emigrated to British Columbia in 1910 aged 37. He enlisted immediately in August 1914, deducting five years from his true age in order to ensure acceptance. The Canadians first entered the front line on 15th April near Ypres where, in the frantic aftermath of the Germans' first ever gas attack, Basil was killed nine days later aged 42.

VILLAGE ECHOES

Many readers may be unaware of a hamlet in the parish of Kilndown called Priors Heath. It is centred on a triangle of houses with a few additional dwellings scattered nearby. It was where our past Chairman, Gordon Batchelor, lived for many years and this piece is largely drawn from his research on the area (with permission of his widow Betty).



As with most places there have been many versions or corruptions of the name over time, but it is suggested that originally it was connected with Richard Puyl who appeared in a local document of 1254. A more positive reference appears in 1684 when a John Hatch was paying £2 per annum for 'Pryors Heath' and later in 1781 when land was described as being next to 'Poyles Heath'

In 1811 the Overseers of the Poor of Goudhurst bought a 'cottage and twenty-five rods at Poiles Heath' for £40 as an extension of the Goudhurst Workhouse. This was Black Dog Cottage, Gordon's home for over 50 years. It is now number one of twelve houses in the triangle. The Cottage was sold in 1839 when the Cranbrook Union opened to accommodate the poor of several local parishes, including Goudhurst. The sales particulars quoted its location as Piles Heath. The origin of the name Black Dog, which is also the name of the adjacent field and wood, comes from an old smuggling legend. This told of a dog fitted with a false black skin by smugglers that travelled from Priors Heath to the coast, returning loaded with lace and silks.

The owner of a beer shop set up in the 1850s at Black Dog Cottage was fined 25/- for not having a licence to trade, but this wasn't the only retail outlet at Priors Heath. There was also a small handy shop run by a Mrs Lucas, which used to stand on what is now

known as 'The Heath'. Although no buying and selling now takes place, the residents often meet here to celebrate auspicious occasions such as the Millennium and Royal weddings etc. A tea party was held to mark the retirement of the local postman Barry. Mostly it is used by the children for playing on.

Once the census records started in 1841, other occupants were listed at Priors Heath! Although it is difficult to place everyone in individual houses, they included a stonemason, a gardener and shoemaker. At that time stone was being quarried in the field to the west, to build Bedgebury. In the following years the census returns show a frequent change of residents in what were then tied cottages housing domestic staff for Bedgebury and agricultural labourers for the tenant farmers of the estate.

The Beresford family built additional cottages in the mid 19th century and converted others to ensure that they had three bedrooms. Two more pairs of cottages were built by Isaac Lewis who bought the Bedgebury Estate in 1899. Lewis sold to the Crown in 1916 and ten years after the end of WWII electricity was installed together with two communal septic tanks, one now replaced with a Klargestor bought by the community. When the larders were converted to bathrooms, the outside toilets became tool sheds.

The increasing mechanisation of farming made the tied cottages redundant and eventually all were sold by the estate. All but one have been extended and modernised to be unrecognisable by their early tenants. The story of change at Priors Heath could probably be repeated in any rural hamlet countryside.

QUARRY CENTRE

Life at the Quarry Centre continues at a steady pace, open on Saturdays for the Shop, Quilting Group on Tuesdays, Art Group on Wednesdays, with an assortment of other bookings from time to time. To hire the QC only costs £5 per hour and is it just the right size for the smaller meeting or event, although it has accommodated 40 seated for a birthday party!

Don't forget we always have milk and eggs, meats in the freezer and a good selection of fresh fruit and vegetables, quite often cheaper than the supermarkets. Still no news on the charitable status front, which is a pity as we do have a couple of people who would like to donate money, but only if we are a registered charity. Talking of money and funds, Penny Pots still turn up (a residue of fundraising for the toilet), the monthly Raffle is proving popular, and the Bling is still selling (remnants from the Three B's Sale in 2013), all small stuff but helps keep the interest going, which we will need as soon as the work on the exterior is put into motion.

Later in the year we have a Birthday! Or should it be three, as the building is 135 years old, the Quarry Centre has been established 35 years and the Saturday Shop 15 years. What are we going to do to celebrate? There are some thoughts, you'll have to wait and see!

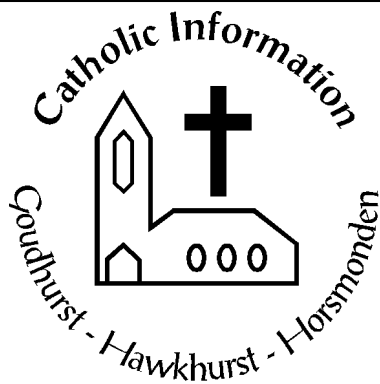

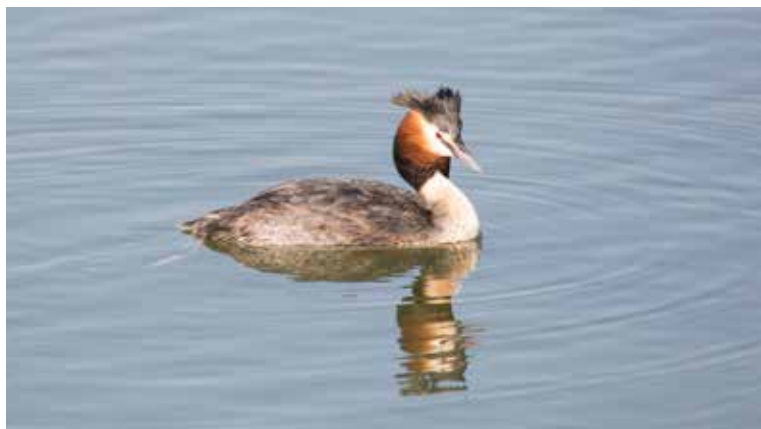

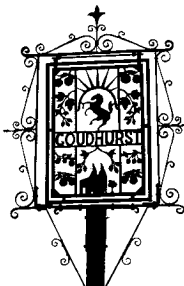

FOOTPATH WALK The Gill and bluebells (Sunday 26 April 2015 at 10:15)

This walk starts at 10.15am at the Tattlebury Triangle. Park on the south side of the Tattlebury Triangle - the triangular area with several large trees located on the south side of the main A262 some 300m east of Goudhurst Church. The route of the walk follows a footpath to the north, downhill onto Chequers Road, west along Chequers Road into The Gill. This is a nature reserve managed by Kent Wildlife Trust. CLIMATE CHANGE IS HAPPENING
Pat Crawford provides the
HADLOW COLLEGE COMMENT AND ADVICE COLUMN

The subject of 'Food' - and the 'Security' attached to it - is once again climbing higher on the agenda. The NFU Conference is no fun 'get-away' for farmers – it is reserved for presentations and discussions about serious matters. That at this year's conference NFU president Meurig Raymond issued a warning about our ever declining self-sufficiency should be taken seriously.

The Oxford farming conference – to give it the full title – was held way back in January. Since then the price of food has seemed to dominate the news as though that is all that interests consumers. The 'big boys' – the multiples – fight it out on the shelves and in the media, so much so that we seem to be forgetting that it is the availability of food that is most important.

It was surely good, from all perspectives, that the conference brought together climate change, population growth and food security. Considering one without taking account of the effects of the others would surely be, at best, blinkered? 2014 was officially the warmest year since records began in 1910, but also the 4th wettest. The latest statistics concerning population growth indicate that by 2030 we shall need 30% more water, 40% more energy, and 50% more food.

The south-east suffers an additional problem that impacts – in economic and social terms – on practically everything: shortage of land. Demand for land is insatiable – price reflects demand – which leads to questions about priorities. Producing food? Housing and infrastructure needs? Green energy? And from this equation, we shouldn't omit way-of-life.

Alongside these issues we have to reduce the national deficit. Mark Lumsdon-Taylor – finance director at Hadlow College – comments: 'Whatever the colour of the next government, deficit reduction will undoubtedly be a top priority and only the method will vary'.

Despite sophisticated analysis – despite some of the best brains in the business – despite hundreds of 'talk shops' - so far we are very short of realistic (workable) projections and solutions regarding the vast sums that will have to be found to keep Britain 'safe'. This surely includes security in relation to food – a basic and essential human requirement.

Arguably, we can all help by valuing the work done by our farmers and growers, paying more attention to seasonality, buying local – regional – British – whenever possible.

THE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION

Members are reminded that the March meeting of the branch will be held on Monday 23rd March at 2.30 pm at the Star and Eagle.

In April we shall be resuming our commemoration of those who died in World War I, remembering Alfred Gurr on 9th April and Basil Clark on 24th April. On Saturday 25th April, ANZAC Day, the Australian flag will fly to offer our respects to those who fell during the Gallipoli landings. Although no local regiments were involved, this campaign ranks as one of the most remarkable feats of arms in military history.

On the night of 24th/25th April 1915 200 ships of the British and French navies, preparing to land 75,000 allied troops on the Turkish mainland, converged on the long, narrow Gallipoli peninsula. Before first light the soldiers disembarked into smaller boats to be rowed or towed ashore onto the narrow, sandy beaches found on a largely rocky coastline. For the ANZAC troops landing at what became known as ANZAC cove there was then little opposition. That came later as they advanced inland. Despite a supporting naval bombardment other units were met with withering rifle and machine gunfire before they reached the shore, and many regiments lost half their strength within minutes, and the water up to fifty yards out to sea was red with blood.

However those who survived showed extraordinary courage and determination as they gained a foothold on the land, but the Turkish defence was so strong that after a few days the allies only managed to advance five miles up the peninsula towards Constantinople. Four or five major battles and other landings further up the coast took place, but by August no further advance seemed possible and plans were made to withdraw the allied forces.

This was no victory, but nothing can dim the quite exceptional bravery and endurance of those who took part. Eight thousand miles from home, facing hostile weather conditions, receiving irregular supplies, the ANZAC forces suffered 33,000 casualties, 10,000 killed, the highest proportion of casualties to their total strength of any allied forces. We shall honour their sacrifice by raising the Australian flag on 25th April.

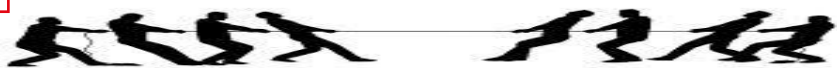
