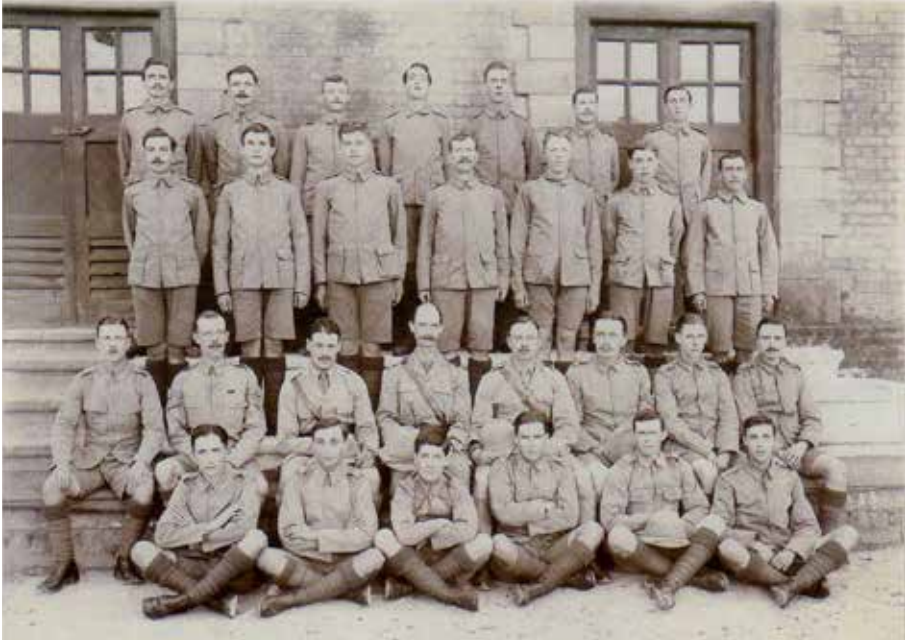

Dear Friends

Happy New Year. I hope that you have enjoyed a wonderful Christmas and that 2016 is starting well for you.

Now that the decorations are coming down and life is returning to normal, what are you left with from Christmas? Was there something that happened, or something you saw or heard that has stayed with you? Perhaps it was something from your family, or something you saw on the TV, or something you heard in church. ## COMMEMORATING THE FALLEN OF THE GREAT WAR JANUARY 1916

All parishioners are invited to attend brief ceremonies which will be held at Goudhurst war memorial at 4pm on January 7th, 13th and 16th to remember local soldiers who died on those dates exactly 100 years ago.

*The mood in Goudhurst and Kilndown at the start of 1916 was grim, with six men – mostly Regulars or experienced Reservists – still unaccounted for after the Battle of Loos in north-eastern France in September & October. The next fatalities occurred in January of 1916, far away in Mesopotamia (now Iraq), and were perhaps more shocking to the villagers since the four men concerned had been part of daily civilian life in the parish until the Great War broke out. They were all Territorials in the 1/5th Buffs (East Kent Regiment) which had been sent to India in October 1914, enabling Regulars to be released for fighting on the Western Front. A year later they were despatched to the Middle East as part of a force marching to relieve British troops besieged by the Turks at Kut-al-Amara. Repeatedly attacked by the Turks, and floundering in impassable terrain, the relief force failed in its mission. The 1/5th Buffs suffered hundreds of casualties.*



**Herbert Orchard Stone**, aged 33. Company Quartermaster Serjeant T/156. A resident of Goudhurst since 1902, his homes included Beresford Road and Cloth Edge in Church Road. He worked as a clerk for the local builders, Davis & Leaney, and was engaged to be married. A particularly keen member of the Territorials and their predecessors, the Volunteers, Herbert Stone was killed in his battalion's first engagement, the Battle of Sheikh Saad on 7th January 1916. He is buried in Amara War Cemetery, 100 miles north of Basra.



**John Lower**, aged 24. Private T/1397. Born in Flimwell, and known in the family as Jack. He was a farm labourer living and working at Three Chimneys Farm on the Bedgebury Estate when war broke out on 4th August 1914. Despite no previous military involvement, he enlisted only four days later, joining the 1/5th Buffs and sailing with them to India in December. Like Herbert Stone, he was killed in the Battle of Sheikh Saad on 7th January 1916 and is buried in Amara War Cemetery.



**Augustus William Lovell**, aged 23. Private T/1391. Known in the family as Gus. Born and brought up in Goudhurst, he lived at Clay Hill Mount, worked just round the corner in North Road for Mr. Crouch, the wheelwright and blacksmith, and was considered a good all-round musician. With three of his brothers already serving in the Regular Army, Gus was possibly the first of our villagers to enlist when war broke out, joining the 1/5th Buffs. He was killed in their second engagement which took place at The Wadi on 13th January 1916, and is buried in Amara War Cemetery.





**Thomas Hugh Wickham**, aged 24. Private T/1160. A member of the prominent farming family. Born at Cloth Edge, brought up at Mount Pleasant House in Ranters Lane, and educated at Cliftonville College for Boys in Margate. Known as Tom, he was a keen sportsman and worked with his father on the family farm at Finchcocks. In December 1913 he and his brother Jack had enlisted in the 5th Buffs Territorials, and they subsequently went with the battalion to India and Mesopotamia. Tom Wickham died of wounds on 16th January 1916, but his body ultimately remained unidentified, so he is commemorated on the memorial to the missing at Basra. His name is recorded on the war memorials in both Goudhurst and Kildown.

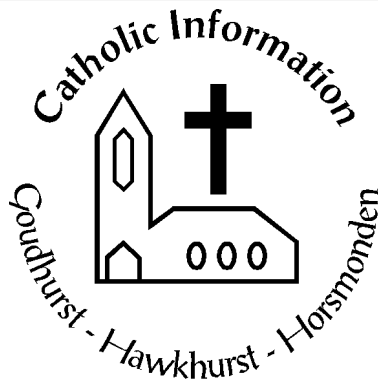

## VILLAGE ECHOES

In January 1916 Goudhurst and Kilndown were hit very hard, very suddenly, by an unforeseen consequence of their young men's sense of comradeship. The community then was far more close-knit than today, with the vast majority of residents working – and playing – within two or three miles of home. Opportunities for travelling further afield were limited, but one possibility open to young men with a sense of adventure was to join the Territorial Force, created by the government in 1908 as a more cohesive successor to the existing Volunteer units, and structured within the established system of county regiments. A large proportion of the nation's armed forces was stretched around the globe to patrol the British Empire, and in the event of war, the UK-based part of the Army would be expected to go where the fighting was, leaving the home territory exposed – hence the need for Territorials. Its members joined up for a fixed term of four years, during which they could be mobilised if a national emergency arose, though for service in the UK only.

Apart from the opportunity to join other like-minded young men in regular activities locally, one of the big attractions of the TF was to get away from home for the annual camp. Thus it was that early in August 1914 a number of young men from our parish belonging to the local TF unit, the 5th Buffs, found themselves – and thousands of others – at Longmoor Camp near Liphook in Hampshire when war was declared. They were immediately mobilised and sent to the regimental barracks at Dover. In the spirit of the time, more young men from the parish were prompt to enlist and, as village lads tend to stick together, especially in times of crisis, some of these volunteered specifically for the 5th Buffs, thus enlarging our mini-community inside the regiment. At the same time, cities and towns all over the country were creating “Pals” battalions by encouraging men to embark upon the great adventure of war alongside their friends, neighbours and workmates: it was a persuasive and successful tool for recruitment, but a fatal flaw was exposed later on when men who had lived together died together, at the same time and in large numbers.

The scale of the war quickly spiralled in every way: growing numbers of recruits for the TF in Kent led to the creation of two extra battalions, and the 5th Buffs were re-named 1/5th; Territorials were invited to volunteer for service overseas; many responded positively. By the end of October 1914 the 1/5th Buffs were on their way to India, releasing Regular troops for the Western Front. In April 1915 28 of the battalion's men from our parish posed together for a formal photograph at their base at Kamptee in central India; but by December their turn to fight had come and they had arrived in Mesopotamia (now Iraq). In January 1916, four of the Goudhurst & Kilndown “Pals” were killed in action and another was destined to die as a prisoner of war. The unforeseen consequence of civilian comradeship transferring into the military had come to pass.

2016 should see our charitable trust set up and running, and a full refurbishment of the exterior completed. Well, there's fifty two weeks left to go!

The Centre is becoming busy in the hiring stakes, with one or two groups having booked for the year already, need a bigger calendar! Sales at the Saturday Shop during 2015 were steady, showing an increase on the previous year. The fresh meat that Ann kindly orders and collects from a local butcher is very popular, but not something that can be done every week as requested, think of it as a treat! Our fruit and vegetable order seems to be getting longer as the weeks

go by and the delivery drivers are amazed at how much we can 'shift' – apparently far more than some well- established village shops not that far away, must be the way we display the goods. We're trying to increase the dry goods side, with more known brands intermingled with the organic and Fairtrade things. We try to keep on top of stock rotation, but from time to time we do end up with a bargain basket of Best Before odds and ends, come in and have a rummage.

Look out for news on how we intend to raise the funds for the refurbishment, this we're looking into and are bearing in mind how busy the village is going to be celebrating Christ Church's 175th anniversary, but don't forget without the foresight of Reverend Henry Harrison in 1880 and Canon Wyndham Johnson in 1980, we wouldn't have a Quarry Centre at all.

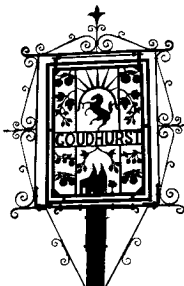

## THE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION

January 1916 fell in the second winter of the Great War when the troops endured another period of cold and rain on the Western Front. Many spent days on end suffering from frostbite and wearing sodden clothing. So in addition to those who were killed we should remember the hardships and miserable conditions under which many of them lived and died.

November 1915 had seen the beginning of the ill-fated Mesopotamia expedition carried out to secure the oilfields of Iraq to ensure that fuel was provided for the Royal Navy. By January 1916 fighting against the Turks had intensified and we shall be remembering men from Goudhurst and Kilndown and their regiments who fell in that campaign.

We should also remember the suffering endured by the horses on the Western Front and elsewhere. They were essential to Britain's war effort, pulling guns and supplies and carrying the wounded to hospital. Huge numbers were killed, not just by shelling, but by exposure to hunger or illness. It was estimated that some 700,000 horses out of 800,000 were killed or died throughout the war.

## GOUDHURST PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Greetings for a happy and peaceful 2016 to all our readers.

In the December Magazine we wrote about your Parish Council taking over the Balcombes Hill car park and the public toilets. More recently we have spent considerable time putting together Council's budget for 2016/17. We are putting aside funds to draw up a Neighbourhood Plan which, once finished and adopted, should help to protect us from having huge housing developments thrust upon the parish as part of the national need to build more houses. We are making allowance to carry out some relatively minor Highways project that Kent Highways are no longer able to fund, as well as a renewal and expanded CCTV system.

Overall we plan a 2.9% increase which works out to be a 1.2% on a Band D equivalent property or a 74p increase in the parish element of a Band D annual Council tax bill.

Cllr Dr Georgia Read-Cutting has launched her project to install a defibrillator in the heritage red telephone kiosk at Kilndown. She has spend time researching the most suitable model and she is now working with the Community Heartbeat Trust. Buying the defibrillator through them brings support from BT and South East Coast Ambulance Service. Georgia is raising the funds to purchase the equipment and we do hope you will support the project with a donation. She will also be running training sessions on the use of the defibrillator for those who would like to be involved in the project. This is a Kilndown project for Kilndown. Contact Georgia on 07411 524813.

Last year during a storm, the weather vane fell from the roof of Goudhurst Parish Hall. Cllr Alan Foster retrieved it and has launched an appeal to renovate it and reinstall it on the roof. The main expense is hiring a hydraulic lift to get up to the roofline of the Hall. If you feel you would like to support this heritage project on the listed building, please contact Alan on 01580 211070.

**CLIMATE CHANGE IS HAPPENING**

GM CROPS are back on the agenda. Moves to allow EU member states to opt out of growing GM crops – in other words, decision to deploy or not to deploy - could result in the UK being able to employ the technology.

Renaud Wilson – a member of Defra’s GM policy team - suggests that giving nations individual opportunity to opt out of GM production may remove current existing barriers at EU level – thus the UK and other countries that are GM-pro will be able to commence production of GM crops. He commented: ‘In principle all the excuses for not allowing GM have been dealt with. The Government wants access to new technologies, including GM. Without that, how are you going to remain competitive and support the economic growth the Government is keen to promote?’

On the same subject, a former chief scientific adviser to the Scottish government - Professor Anne Glover - has said she is hopeful that the SNP might change their policy in regard to their ban on GM.

Amber Rudd, Secretary of State for Energy and Climate Change, has announced the Government’s intention to close remaining coal-fired power stations by 2025. At the current time coal provides about a quarter of the UK’s electricity. Ms Rudd said: "Frankly, it cannot be satisfactory for an advanced economy like the UK to be relying on polluting, carbon-intensive 50-year-old coal-fired power stations". Ms Rudd says the Government wants more gas-fired power stations to be built. The major parties have all signed up to phasing out coal. The announcement was made ahead of the UN Climate Change Conference due to commence in Paris on 30th November. Meanwhile environmentalists are concerned that sources of renewable energy are insufficiently promoted.

The latest news in relation to the Greenland glaciers is full of foreboding. According to a NASA-funded study, Zachariae Isstrom is the latest Greenland glacier to undergo rapid change. It drains ice from an area of 35,440 square miles (91,780 square kilometers) - estimated to be about 5 per cent of the Greenland Ice Sheet. Were it to melt completely, it is estimated that the global sea level would rise more than 18 inches.

“North Greenland glaciers are changing rapidly” according to Jeremie Mouginot, an assistant researcher in the Department of Earth System Science at the University of California. “The shape and dynamics of Zachariae Isstrom have changed dramatically over the last few years. The glacier is now breaking up and calving high volumes of icebergs into the ocean.....”.

## MUSIC IN KILNDOWN

Following the sad report last month of the closure of Finchcocks Museum of keyboards instruments after more than forty years, it is encouraging to see the Kilndown Community choir going from strength to strength. This was wonderfully demonstrated at their Christmas Concert on 12th December when they delighted a packed Christ Church.

As the January Magazine has a couple of spare pages I thought it may be appropriate to reprint the following item from the last issue of the Kilndown Village Newsletter. This shows that although we will be losing a number of historic harpsichords from Kilndown parish when they are auctioned off in May, at least we have one new instrument.

### THE BIRTH OF A HARPSICHORD

Perhaps birth is not quite the right word, but this process did take nine months. First a little of the background leading up over the years to the building of this instrument.

When I was around eleven years old I started having piano lessons. After a few years my teacher told me that she had seen and tried a virginals at Morley's music shop in Tonbridge. I visited the shop and was enthralled by the sound of this plucked stringed instrument made by John Morley in the workshops in Bromley. After a visit to the workshops with my mother I placed an order for a virginals. Thanks to funds being available from my daily paper round and a Friday evening/Saturday morning grocery round I was able to arrange a hire purchase agreement.

In 1967 I lost my job with an electronics company in Jarvis Brook following a disagreement with one of the directors concerning my need to leave on time for my Wednesday evening junior choir practice at Brenchley church. I was later persuaded by some teacher friends in Brenchley that I should apply for a teacher training course at Christ Church College, Canterbury. Following an interview I was accepted as a music student. When it came to the choice of a main instrument I chose to have lessons on the college's harpsichord. It was a great privilege for me to have three years of lessons from Trevor Pinnock, then leader of the Galliard Harpsichord Trio, which later became the English Concert.

Towards the end of my course I was offered an Italian harpsichord made by Clayson and Garrett in Lyminge. Sadly I was unable to accept their very generous offer as I did not have the necessary funds.

It was only recently following the death of my mother that sufficient funds from my grandparents' wills enabled me to look again at this possibility.

I asked Alastair Laurence, then curator at Finchcocks and head of the Broadwood Piano Workshop, for advice on one harpsichord builder. Alastair offered to build an instrument for me using a kit made by The Paris Workshop.

Because space at Quarry House is fairly limited the instrument chosen was a two manual Flemish harpsichord based upon the instruments of the Ruckers family of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries.



I had hoped to follow progress of the build at Finchcocks, but Alastair had failed to tell me he was moving the workshop to Lythe near Whitby in North Yorkshire. Due to difficulties with some parts of the kit it took considerably longer for the instrument to be completed. The finished instrument arrived late on Tuesday 13<sup>th</sup> October.

There are three sets of strings, two at 8 foot pitch (normal piano pitch) and one at 4 foot pitch, playing an octave higher. The upper keyboard jacks (the plucking mechanism of a harpsichord) pluck one set of 8 foot strings fairly near the end of the string giving a slightly nasal sound. The lower keyboard jacks pluck the other set of 8 foot strings further away from the string end giving a less strident sound. The 4 foot strings are also plucked by a set of jacks on the lower keyboard, which can be moved on or off by a stop knob rather like an organ. By moving the upper keyboard inwards the two keyboards can be coupled together so that all sets of strings can be played at once. A buff stop with little felt pads can be moved to touch the strings of the upper keyboard giving a muted pizzicato effect.

The instrument looks splendid in its deep red colour finish with a cream interior to the lid. Flemish printed papers surround the keyboards setting off the ebony keys with bone accidentals and pearwood arcades. The quality and variety of sounds produced by this harpsichord are outstanding.



At last I can make full use of some of the music that I used to play something over forty five years ago. If only my now rather creaky fingers still worked as they did then!
