FROM THE VICAR

Dear Friends

Every now and then someone has a simple idea which they put into practice to create something brilliant. I came across one recently. The idea is to use the power of the internet to connect people in the West who have a few pounds in their pocket, which they would like to use to make the world a better place, with people in the Third World who are setting up small businesses and who need some seed funding to get themselves going.

This idea has been put into practice by Lend with Care, a charity that has worked with people in poor countries for many years. They run a website (lendwithcare.org) which gives details of entrepreneurs in Africa, Asia and Latin America who are seeking small sums of money - usually between £500 - £1000 to start, develop or grow their businesses. Rather than just giving them a donation, ordinary people like you and me are invited to invest in one or more of these businesses by lending a sum as small as £15. If the business goes well, the loan is repaid after an agreed period - usually 12 months - so that it can be reinvested for someone else to use.

The beauty of this idea is that it takes small loans, of a size that we can all afford, and uses the gifts and talents of the entrepreneurs in the Third World to turn them into something more, before the loan is returned so it can be used again.

At St Mary's this month we gave out £1 coins to everyone in church, and invited them to use their God given gifts and talents to grow that money into something more - and all the profits will be invested with Lend with Care.

So far people have used their coins to bake and sell dog biscuits at the Fete, buy sweets for a Guess how many sweets in the jar game and to make and sell fresh lemonade. The Heath stores in Horsmonden are even using their £1 to make special Lend with Care pies with profits going to the charity.

Like many of the best ideas, Jesus got there first. In the gospel of Matthew, chapter 13, he compares the Kingdom of God to a Mustard Seed - the smallest of all seeds - which when planted grows up to become a wonderful tree which gives shade and shelter to animals, birds and humans. It's a story about something small being used to create something much bigger and better.

We've all been given something by God - a gift, talent or desire; we're all good at something - even if we don't feel that to be the case sometimes. The parable of the Mustard Seed reminds us that whatever we have to offer, however small it might seem, can be used to grow something unexpectedly wonderful. It's the same principle which lies behind Lend with Care who are ready to help turn our small loans into an income which can provide a home, food, education and healthcare for those who need it most.

This month, why not join in with us. Take a £1 and use your talents to turn it into something more which can be invested with Lend with Care. God loves to bless small things, and to turn them into something unexpectedly wonderful. This is a simple way to join in with that work.

The first of the gatherings at the war memorial in Kilndown remembering the one hundredth anniversary of the death of one of the Kilndown names listed on the memorial took place on 27th May. The occasion was led by Peter Albertini, a former Captain in the Royal Navy. The group remembered Stoker Victor Moore, who at the tender age of 19 died when the mine layer HMS Princess Irene exploded and sank off Sheppey, killing the crew of 221, 79 dockyard workers and 2 members of the public.

As many of you will have noticed the outside of the Centre is becoming somewhat 'tatty' – nothing that a good tidy up and lick of paint (bit more than a lick – probably!) won't put right. We have started fundraising for this, a Haberdashery Sale raised £110 and we will benefit from the Hidden Garden Event held on June 21. A generous donation of £452 has been received from the now closed Goudhurst and Kilndown Tea Club, for which we thank them and of course all who attended

the Sale and the Garden Event.

As is usual during the summer months sales at the Saturday Shop drop, it's surprising how just two or three customers being away and peoples gardens home grown fruit and vegetables being plentiful make such a difference (especially when they give the excess to their neighbours) needless to say ordering becomes a nightmare! Too much.....too little, who'd be a shop keeper!

A few customers have noted that we now stock more general goods, not just organic versions of day to day items. We still have the Eco Friendly cleaning materials and can obtain gluten free goods. As always it is better to order bread, but generally there is always something in the freezer for emergencies if we have sold out. Our freezers are well stocked with meats, we sell good quality bacon, ham and eggs and like to think we are a fairly useful addition to the weekend!

KILNDOWN QUILTERS CELEBRATE 40 YEARS



The first quilt made for fundraising was auctioned at Bedgebury School in 1975 in aid of repairs to the tower of Christ Church. It raised £400 which was a considerable sum for a quilt in those days. Sewn by Ellen Boorman, Muriel Johnson, Hermione Pearson and me (Ann Olley), we met in various homes, laying the templates on the floor to design the quilt and then sewed it in sections. The next quilt was made for The Queen's Silver Jubilee. We chose pastel shades of yellow, pink, green, grey and silver. This was raffled in the village and £200 put towards the Jubilee Fund.

Late 1979 found the village confronted by a serious problem. The village shop was due to close in March 1980. The answer lay with Kilndown Institute building, then used as a paint store by a local builder. In the centre of the village, given for village use, it was the ideal solution. The loss of the shop meant the closing of the post office where pensions and family allowances were collected as well as the very basic facilities available for a surgery. Lots of fund raising within the village and many hours of voluntary work and dozens of repairs later, saw a transformation. In April 1980 we opened our new community centre. A once-a-week sub-post office was functioning and a doctor's surgery providing running water instead of an enamel bowl and a thermos for hot water! Kilndown Institute, the original village reading room, was renamed The Quarry Centre, as it was adjacent to the quarry pond. Once a week we had a produce stall, sold bread from the local baker and home made cakes and pies. As the school was still in Kilndown we also kept quite a selection of sweets and a few essential items.

A Meeting Place for Quilters

The Quarry Centre provided the Quilters with a central meeting place and our numbers increased. At one point we had fifteen of us sewing quilts. No machines for us! We only hand sew. We have recorded most of our work but some items have 'escaped'! No two quilts are the same and the size, colour schemes and patterns are very varied. Our village and Goudhurst, plus other local areas have been well catered for and a considerable amount of money raised.

We have made quilts for numerous national charities, and our latest large quilt was made to celebrate The Queen's Diamond Jubilee. We were thrilled with the result of this one.....our best ever! We chose The Jubilee Sailing Trust as our charity. The Trust owns two tall sailing ships which give sailors of all ages, who are less able, the chance of sailing with assistance. Our design was Ship's Wheel and was composed of over 1500 diamond shapes in royal colours. Thanks to Mavis Gray and her son, the quilt was auctioned at an event at The Mall Gallery, London and fetched a marvellous £1500.

We know that we have sewn about seventy quilts and raised thousands of pounds for good causes. Auctioned, raffled and given away, we also make quilts to order. Over the years I remember the many friendships connected by needles, threads and cups of coffee!

Reflecting on those friends no longer with us and those who have moved from the village, the quilting mornings have provided a very social occasion and have been a source of much enjoyment over the years. We still meet on Tuesday mornings although there are only six of us at the moment.

Our non-sewing friends Ruby, Kath and sometimes Marie and others who join us for 'elevenses' are very welcome.


If you enjoy simple sewing and can spare an hour or two now and again, do please join us. Tuesday mornings from 10am till noon.

HOSPICE IN THE WEALD

Two leading local choirs are joining forces to stage a summer evening of musical treats for charity in a beautiful garden setting.

The Royal Tunbridge Wells Orpheus Male Voice Choir and Women In Harmony will be taking part in the two-hour concert at the glasshouse of Coolings Garden Centre at Knockholt on July 11 to raise funds for Hospice in the Weald.

VILLAGE ECHOES



As we celebrate the 200th anniversary of the British victory over Napoleon at Waterloo, it is intriguing to note a connection close to Goudhurst. In the 1935 Coronation Book Alfred Tiffin wrote of his conversation with a Mr J Rofe who was a woodreeve (wood steward) at Glassenbury Farm, bordering on Goudhurst along the B2085 from The Peacock Inn.

John Rofe submitted a photo of his father standing beside the “Jaffa stone” in Glassenbury Park. This marked the supposed burial site of a horse of that name which had been owned by Napoleon and ridden by him at the famous

battle of Waterloo. The horse was named after Napoleon’s victory at Jaffa, Palestine in 1799. The burial site had been confirmed by the then owners, Baron and Baroness Nettelblatt, who said that one of Napoleon’s friends had rented Glassenbury at the time. Although the inscription was by then deteriorating it had read:

To Jaffa, the favourite charger of Napoleon, aged 37 – 1829

More was revealed in a series of letters to a newspaper (date unknown) involving our late Secretary Len Pierce. He suggested that the horse had been the ‘spoils of war’ for Marshal Beresford of Bedgebury who had been in charge of Wellington’s quartermaster arrangements, although why Jaffa was interred at Bedgebury wasn’t explained. At this time another connection was revealed, that of William Field (see June Village Echo) of Goudhurst village forge. He had apparently been farrier major to the Iron Duke and responsible for his horse called Copenhagen, named in honour of a previous battle at Copenhagen.

A newspaper article in the Goudhurst & Kilndown Local History Society archives moves the story on to the late 1960s. The owners at this time were the Roberts family and Mrs Elizabeth Roberts was featured in the story. She stated that, according to the family record book, the horse was owned by a Mr Green, the tenant of Glassenbury until 1827, and that he instructed his gamekeeper to shoot Jaffa in 1826 because of his age, slightly earlier than reported by Tiffin. This the reluctant man did early one morning after blindfolding the horse with a silk handkerchief. In addition it was recorded that Jaffa was buried with an iron trunk full of coins.

Mrs Roberts arranged for a team from the Buffs’ Territorial Army unit to excavate the site in order to prove the story and find the treasure. After six hours digging with the aid of metal detectors all that came up was two horseshoes, no bones and no treasure!

A one-time marathon runner who was struck down by terminal cancer is showing his gratitude for the care he receives at Hospice in the Weald by urging runners to sign up for the charity's annual 10K Tunbridge Wells road run.

Grandfather Steve Chittenden said: "Prior to being diagnosed with a terminal illness, I would never shy away from a sporting challenge and I hope others feel the same. "The £50,000 that we want to raise could enable Hospice in the Weald to fund their In-Patient Unit in Pembury for a whole week providing 15 patients with a terminal illness specialist care, pain and symptom control in an environment where they feel safe and their families and carers supported.



On Saturday June 13th the Annual Goudhurst Fete and Dog Show was held on the Glebe Field. Organised this year by the Scouts, supported by the Primary School PTA, St Mary's PCC and the Parish Hall, it proved an excellent day and despite the thunderstorms that preceded it and the cold windy morning the sun progressively shone as the afternoon progressed. So this year macs, woollies and wellies were not a necessity and stands and marquees were not blown away. As the sun came out, so the numbers swelled, the dogs arrived for the (as always highly controversial) judging and a great time was had by all who did not fall out of bordering trees ! Sean Gilder compered the day on the microphone and Richard Vinton compered the Dog Show for which a huge thank you and also to the Fete Committee - James Cooke, Andrea Kirkby, Jacqui Clark, Louise Bushrod, Jane Russell, Richard Vinton and Tony Richards. As the day drew to a close, almost 100 children from 4 to 14 toppled the tug-of-war winners (great sports) so everyone – children, parents and grandparents - could go home victorious!

Taking just a little more time than HMG took to announce the makeup of the Her Majesty's Cabinet, GPC are delighted to announce the makeup of the new team for Goudhurst, Kilndown and Curtisden Green:-

Cllr Stephen Wickham takes over Chairmanship of the Amenities Committee (maintains public areas, the Plain, ponds, memorials, play areas and soon the public lavatories & car park). The Highways & Footpaths Committee will continue to be chaired by Cllr David Boniface (works with Kent Highways on road issues, monitors public transport and supports and maintains footpaths). Cllr Guy Sutton will chair the Business & Communication Committee (Broadband and other issues supporting business and employment).

Cllr Antony Harris will take on The Burial Board (St Mary's and Christ Church burial grounds, records, fees & maintenance). Cllr Phil Kirkby will continue to Chair the Youth Committee (works with local youth organisations, the Chequer Field and other play areas). Cllr Barry Noakes will continue to chair the Planning Committee (comments on all Parish planning applications before decisions are taken by TW Borough Council).

The Glebe Field Committee will be chaired by Cllr Harris (to acquire or lease for the community the upper & lower Glebe Fields from the Diocese). Housing will be chaired by Cllr Wickham (works with TWBC on S106 allocation of affordable housing and with relevant Housing Associations).

The Policy & Staffing Committee is by convention manned by the Chairmen of the GPC Committees and usually meets annually to review the coming year budget and Standing Orders for recommendation to Council.

The following will represent your Parish Council on other committees in the community: Cllrs Foster & Kirkby – The Goudhurst Parish Hall Committee; Cllr Boniface - The Hop Pickers Line Cttee; Cllrs Mrs Ash, Mrs Read-Cutting and Sutton – The Kilndown Recreational Hall Trust, Millennium Green Trust and Quarry Centre; Cllrs Harris & Kirkby - The KALC Area Cttee; Police & Neighbourhood Watch Liaison - Cllr Gilder

and Peter Rolington; Dorothy Bathurst Charity – Cllr Noakes and Richard Bushrod; Goudhurst Education Foundation – Cllr Noakes; Parish Hon Tree warden – David Edwards; Parish Hon Pond Wardens – Cllr Broom and Ed Bates; Church Room Play Area Cttee – Cllr Kirkby.

John Ward in his report as retiring GPC representative on the Superfast Broadband Project has, with Lorne Mitchel, presented an account of what has been achieved so far for Goudhurst, Curtisden Green and Kilndown and where the project goes in future. SUPERFAST BROADBAND: THE FINAL FRONTIER

In the last month, Kent County Council has advised the Parish Council that Callfow Solutions have completed their contract to upgrade the cabinets on the Goudhurst Telephone Exchange to Superfast Broadband.

This is a major milestone in the five year campaign to get better broadband and gives a new set of broadband options for many of those who are connected to the Goudhurst Exchange - including a fixed wireless option for those that have line of sight to St Mary's Church.

Aside from Bethany School being able to implement a new twenty first century learning system, several businesses which were planning to leave the Parish because of poor Broadband speeds have decided to remain in the Parish. To date there are 80 connections on the new infrastructure and more are in the pipeline.

Callflow will also be marketing their service over the coming months to promote an increase in take up in the areas where superfast broadband is already available. If you are not already on the Callflow network, you can enquire about the new services by calling them on 0845 274 1114.

During the next phase of the project, which we are calling "the final frontier" Councillors and members of the Golden Thread will attempt to get better coverage for the parts of the Parish that are still in a superfast broadband "not spot". As a first step over the next six months Callflow Solutions have agreed to investigate the feasibility of extending coverage of their network to Kilndown and Prior's Heath on a commercial basis.

We will continue to update you on progress through the Parish magazine and on the project website: www.goudhurst.net as well as at our monthly informal meeting at Weeks the baker's from 10.30-12 on the First Friday of every month.



GLEBE FIELD VILLAGE GREEN - We have good news!

The KCC Regulation Committee Member Panel determined on 19th May 2015, that past use of The Glebe Field has met all the criteria for successful registration as a Village Green. It is therefore now registered as Goudhurst Village Green.

In practical terms this means that residents of Goudhurst Parish have the right of access to carry out their "legal sports and pastimes" on the field in perpetuity.

The field is owned by the Diocese of Canterbury, with the Village Green registration changing neither the ownership in any way, nor compelling the Diocese to carry out maintenance. Regular maintenance is of course vital (mowing, weed control, hedge cutting, litter picking, etc.) and to date the Diocese has carried out only minimal maintenance which has not met standards required for general use. Confirming Village Green status is therefore a very large step in the right direction, rather than the end of the journey.

Goudhurst Parish Council continues to negotiate with the Diocese to purchase the field, or in the event of that not being possible, agreeing a long lease. We wish these negotiations every success, as either outcome would enable the Parish Council to undertake the ongoing maintenance, without which we will be left with Brer Rabbit's briar patch in the future!

Finally, huge thanks to all of you for your help in supporting the Village Green application – we could not have done this without you. All Goudhurst residents can now be very proud of their Glebe Field Village Green in perpetuity.
