

#### FROM THE VICAR

#### Dear Friends

At its heart prayer is very simple - it's really just about being in touch with God - and we don't need any special words to pray. But some people have a particular gift of putting thoughts and hopes into words in a way that can shape our prayers and focus them, and many people use prayers written by others and find them helpful as they spend time with God.

This is a prayer that I am particularly enjoying at the moment. I can't remember where I found it, nor who wrote it, but I hope it helps you in your prayers. I offer it with a simple reflection on each short section. You could use this to pause some time in a busy day, and to let God speak.

Sometimes You speak, Lord, in tongues so strange that I must pray for grace to obey without understanding.

Our culture tells us to be suspicious of things we don't understand. But we will never fully understand God and his ways. Prayer means letting ourselves trust even when we don't have all (or even any) answers. What do you need from God today?

Sometimes You sing such a lovely song that I must laugh at the silly tune I thought was wisdom.

Humility is a great gift. And in front of God, we can only be humble. What 'silly tune' have you been singing recently? What 'lovely song' do you hear God singing to you?

Sometimes You shout in a voice so loud that I must awake and confess again that I was sleeping.

TV, Facebook, another glass of wine, being too busy, working too hard there are a thousand ways in which we dull our senses and sleepwalk through life. What do you need to wake up from?

> But in this moment when silence is Your word to me and stillness is my prayer I rest within a confidence born in the quiet of Your smile: I am beloved.

'God is love', says the bible - not just a general feeling of love, but a deliberate and specific love for every person - including you. Take a moment to pause and to know that you are beloved by God; He loves you.



#### **DERRICK HEAD**

It is with much sadness that the Friends of St Mary's Church note Derrick's passing.

The Friends of St Mary's Church was established in the mid-1980s with the objective of raising funds to help preserve the fabric of this magnificent building. Derrick, from the outset, was committed to the Friends as a committee member, then as chairman from 1995 to 2003 and finally as our patron.

For many years Derrick and Edna were mainstays of the Friends' Christmas Coffee Morning, now the Friends' Christmas Fair. His contributions as a skilled wood turner and worker will be remembered in many homes throughout the locality; from dolls houses, where Edna's skilled needlework provided the accessories, to Noah's Arks, nativity scenes, castles, aircraft carriers and those wonderful monks carrying out a variety of tasks. Over the years Derrick and Edna personally raised thousands of pounds for the Friends in this way. For twenty five years the Friends' August art exhibition provided a most noteworthy village event; Derrick was involved right from the start.

As Chairman of the Friends he brought his considerable knowledge of village life and history combined with quiet diplomacy, experience and drive to making the Friends important to the financial and social well-being of the Church. He had an eye for detail which was so evident in all he created and everything he managed.

Throughout his life Derrick was a pillar of our community; a kind, understated and gentle man who always had a clear focus along with the energy and commitment to make a difference in so many ways and through various local organisations. He was a great man and it was a privilege to know him.

Our thoughts and prayers are with Edna at this difficult time.

## COMMEMORATING THE FALLEN OF THE GREAT WAR

15th November 1914: Ernest Cole, Lance-Serjeant 14511, 2nd Battalion, Grenadier Guards. Family home in Blue Coats Lane, Goudhurst; he had worked at Crowbourne Farm before enlisting in 1909. Probably the very first Goudhurst soldier to arrive in France, landing at Le Havre on 13th August 1914, he was wounded in action near the Menin Road, Ypres, and died in hospital at Boulogne, aged 25.

I have just been advised that G P C have agreed that they will pay for the plinth which means we will have at least £500 to go to the surgery.

## SOME CLIMATE CHANGE IS HAPPENING Pat Crawford provides the HADLOW COLLEGE COMMENT AND ADVICE COLUMN

Energy - and how to secure supplies in the future - is of ongoing concern. So far a holistic solution that takes account of all the issues involved has not been found – and it is very unlikely it will be found in the near future – yet surely coordinated planning is crucial?

Solar panels are becoming more and more familiar on rooftops and across fields in most parts of the UK. Arguments continue as to whether or not solar farms should be built on land used – or which could be used – for food production. Concerns relating to the environmental impact have not diminished – rather, they are on the increase.

One particular project is creating a lot of interest: an 800 floating panel has been installed on a reservoir at a fruit farm in Berkshire. The owner stated that this solution is more lucrative than using fields because there is no loss of income involved.

Some scientists have thrown a spanner in the works by declaring that many of the millions of panels that have been erected face the wrong way! It was generally assumed that panels should face in a southerly direction but it now seems that west-facing panels can generate a more even flow of electricity.

Way back in April this year the Department of Energy and climate Change issued a set of guidelines that included, the most important:

'Support for solar PV should ensure proposals are appropriately sited, give proper weight to environmental considerations such as landscape and visual impact, heritage and local amenity and provide opportunities for local communities to influence decisions that affects them'.

It is important that the planning concerns of local communities are properly heard in matters that directly affect them.

The document also comments in relation to proposals to build solar farms in ANOBs (Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty), impact on views and various other environmental-related considerations. It appears the document embraces all concerns – but does it in reality? It is absolutely impossible to be categorical and the fear is that many judgments may be made subjectively rather than objectively.

And one rather obvious question continues to arise on an almost daily basis. Is it sensible that we continue to build residential and commercial properties that do not have the benefit of solar energy – in fact - do not incorporate any measures that would help to make homes and business premises more sustainable in relation to energy, water and waste? Saving in financial terms now could be very costly in the future.

October GPC News commented on "...the forecast of an Indian summer ...etc." Well, the 39 mm rain on the night of the 10th contributing to a month's rain in just a few days shows how much our weather is as variable as always, which makes respect for our gardeners all the more justified. At 18.30 on Thursday 9th October at the Star and Eagle, to the appropriate accompaniment of wine and canapés, an enthusiastic gathering of supporters and participants awaited the presentation of cups and rosettes after the declaration of winners of the 2014 Goudhurst in Bloom competition. Special thanks must go to Angela Broom for again organising the competition and to Gill Wallis-Hosken for accepting the challenge of choosing winners from the excellent 2014 entries.

Your Council has continued to defend the provision of Public Toilets at Balcombes Hill as well as the weekend Amenity Refuse Scheme for Goudhurst, Kilndown and Curtisden Green. Whilst we still hope to retain these services it transpired at a meeting with TWBC, attended by Stephen Wickham and our Clerk, that as well as the cost (to which we will most likely be required to contribute) the issue is further complicated by the random mix of waste deposited which results in landfill disposal at considerably greater cost than recycling. We remain hopeful of a resolution though probably not without cost.

#### NOTICE TO ALL EX-SERVICEMEN

To mark the 70th anniversary of D-Day the French Government intends to award the Legion d'Honneur to all ex-servicemen involved in the Normandy landings or the Liberation of Paris or France in 1944. This includes Army, Royal Navy and Royal Air Force personnel. The notice was initially sent to the British Legion, but anyone wishing to apply for this award or who knows anyone who could qualify is invited to contact me or can pick up an Application Form from the Ex-Servicemen's Club.

Applicants must give details of their service on the form provided and then send it on to the Ministry of Defence (MoD). If the MoD supports the application, it will then be forwarded to the French Embassy.

#### VILLAGE ECHOES

Local newspapers have always been a good source of information for tracing events which took place in a particular area and which are now long gone and forgotten about. With the recent on-line digitisation of many newspapers making such items easier to find, this month's Village Echo contains a selection of Goudhurst news during the month of November as reported in previous centuries.

At Cranbrook Petty Sessions in November 1860, one James Brabon pleaded guilty to stealing a quantity of hop-poles belonging to Mr Wickham of Goudhurst. He was sentenced to 21 days' hard labour.

In November 1861 the Goudhurst Rifle Corps Drum and Fife band held their practice sessions in the National School on Clay Hill under the instruction of Sergeant G M Stevens.

In November 1892, it was reported that Guy Fawkes Day had passed off very quietly in the village (was this unusual, one wonders?) and that the Primitive Methodist Chapel in Beresford Road had held a fruit banquet and entertainment, which the reporter considered something of a novelty.

In the same month Alfred James Cullen was appointed Chief Goods Clerk at the newly opened Hope Mill Station, Goudhurst.

In November 1893, five cases of scarlet fever were reported among the families of Clay Hill Mount.

In November 1895 the Cottage Gardeners' Mutual Improvement Society held their autumn show in the Vine Assembly rooms, Goudhurst. Among the exhibits was a vegetable marrow weighing 40lbs.

In November 1904 a whist match took place in the Parish Hall between teams from Goudhurst and Kilndown. Goudhurst won by a very narrow margin of 23 to 22. There were 18 men in each team.

A year later, in November 1905, Dr Sealy promoted a Smoking Concert in the same place, with Mr P T Smith at the piano - this is likely to have been a men-only gathering. During the same month the Providence Chapel at Curtisden Green, which had been built in 1878 by the Rev J J Kendon at a cost of £733, was re-opened. It had cost £350 to enlarge the chapel sufficiently to seat 75 and to install heating apparatus.

Excitement was caused in November 1913 when unfavourable weather conditions forced a Lieutenant Connor of the Army Flying Corps to land in a field on the Combwell estate.
