### **3RD AUGUST 1974-2014 RUBY WEDDING ANNIVERSARY**

Tony and I would like to thank Hugh and the Goudhurst church family for giving us such a warm welcome as, along with our family, we joined you for your family service on Sunday 3rd August, which was our Ruby Wedding Anniversary. It made our day even more special and as I said, felt like coming home once again.

I was born in Trowswell Cottage, North Road, opposite the entrance to Lover's Lane. Miss Kathleen Hope lived in the adjoining cottage. A most sincere lady who never walked but always trotted everywhere. She cleaned the church diligently for many years. There was no bathroom and no electricity so my birth was lit by oil lamps at 2am on an early January morning, attended by Nurse Walsh and Doctor Bolt. Four years later my parents Reg (also known as Bob) and Joyce Bowles moved into a new house called St Cuby's in Blind Lane where they ran a small holding growing mostly strawberries and potatoes and kept pigs. The house is now much altered since my mother moved to Biddenden in 1979 when she could no longer manage on her own after my father's unexpected death at 51 years in 1972.

I have many fond memories of my early years attending the original Goudhurst primary school with Mr Bennett as headmaster and Mrs Eileen Jackson as school secretary. There was a large Sunday school run by Miss Crusoe and my teacher was Miss Wendy Richards. My mother came to play the piano for the choruses, which we knew from memory. My father was organist and choir master at St Mary's from 1939-1972 and the piano now in the children's room was bought by parishioners in his memory. I sang in the church choir as soon as I was big enough for a gown, along with my older sister Maralyn with our grandfather Reg Bowles singing with the bass voices. Besides farming, he was a blacksmith by profession and kept the forge at Glassenbury. He served as a farrier sergeant in France during the First World War. We had annual suppers of bangers and mash for choir and bell ringers and those who could, provided the entertainment that followed. There was carol singing around the village before Christmas with a round on the hand bells to let people know we had arrived and I seem to remember at least 2 full carols were sung at each house! After my father's death my younger sister Joy had organ lessons and at 15 took on the post of organist at St Mary's for about 4 years until she left for college in 1979, while my mother usually accompanied Evensong during this time.

My father also had a dance band, 'The Revellers' fulfilling many bookings from the years during the Second World War and still in demand for dances and social functions in the area right up to his death. My mother played the piano accordion and she along with dad on the piano were often asked to entertain what was then called the Old Folks Club, which met in the Ex-servicemen's club. It was members of the Ex-servicemen's club who also organised an annual village trip to the coast when as many as 13 coaches would be full and waved off from the Plain by those not going. Children were given 7 shillings and 6 pence to spend, a fortune in those days- about 37 pence now.

I arrived in Goudhurst on Saturday 2nd August in time for the unveiling of the refurbished war memorial – my uncle, Mervyn Bowles, was killed in a flying accident during the Second World War. I met two school friends who I hadn't seen for many years as well as a few people I had known when I lived in Goudhurst, which was a great joy. I went into church again on Thursday and as I left I spoke with an elderly man who was visiting

the church for the first time in 70 years. He had been a pupil at Bethany School and was a server during the Second World War for Canon MacMichael who had such an influence on him that he too became a priest. My father would have been organist at this time. Canon MacMichael officiated at my parents wedding service in 1947 and I was baptised by him. He and his wife were very hospitable people, commented on by the gentleman I met who particularly remarked on the generosity of Mrs MacMichael when food was in short supply.

My husband, who I met whilst at college in Canterbury, and I now live in north Oxfordshire. We spent the week at Three Chimneys Oast and from the balcony we could look across to Goudhurst, with the church on the horizon. A wonderful week prompting many happy memories.

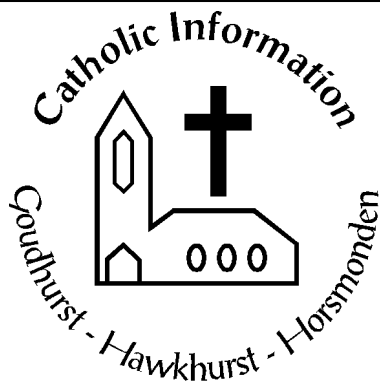
### **A NEW UNIVERSITY IN OUR CORNER OF KENT !**

## FOOTPATH WALK - SATURDAY 20TH SEPTEMBER

You are invited to join a walk on Saturday 20th September starting at 2pm by the lake at the junction of Grovehurst Lane and Hayman's Hill. There is roadside parking alongside the lake on Grovehurst Ln. Approximate post code is TN12 8DN and map reference is 715-409. Directions from Goudhurst - follow North Rd turning off left, signposted to Horsmonden, then take the first right along a minor road, uphill, to the lake on the left side of the road.

The walk will be at an easy pace on footpaths along a ridge with views of Goudhurst over the Teise valley and a chance to admire this year's apple crop. We will cross the river Teise at Stone Bridge, follow footpath WC3 to Finchurst Farm, then footpath WC6 to return over the Teise and uphill back to Grovehurst Ln. by 4pm.

The walk will involve a few stiles and, depending on the weather, there could be some muddy stretches. Everyone is welcome to join this walk.

## GOUDHURST MARKS THE UNVEILING OF IT'S RENOVATED WAR MEMORIAL

According to the BBC South East Today programme, over 300 people attended the occasion which was graced with the presence of the MP for Royal Tunbridge Wells, the High Sheriff, two Deputy Lieutenants, the Mayor and Lady Mayoress of Royal Tunbridge Wells, the District Commander of Police, Borough Councillors and Goudhurst Parish Councillors. Also there, were the grandson and great grandson of Sir Charles Jessel (who originally donated the land on which the Memorial was built) and the grandson of the original architect. All of the donors to the War Memorial Restoration Fund had been invited and it was delightful to see so many of the relatives of the deceased. Luckily the road from Clay Hill to the Goudhurst crossroads had been closed to accommodate such a large gathering.

The ceremony began at 10.45 am with the Chairman of the War Memorial Committee introducing Colonel Peter Bishop. OBE. DL. to the committee members. After a short welcome speech Colonel Bishop then officially unveiled the Memorial while the standard bearers from the Buffs and from the Royal British Legion saluted. The Memorial was then blessed by the Revd Hugh Nelson, vicar of Goudhurst and Kildown. The DL then thanked the people of Goudhurst for their very great efforts over the past 12 months which had resulted in a restoration which had been completed to a very high standard, on time and within budget. He also noted that the Memorial gardens had been re-planted and that low level lighting had been installed.

Several activities then followed, among them a reception held in the Goudhurst Ex-Servicemen's Club (kindly sponsored by Great Battlefield Tours) while Roger Joye got down to the task of selling and signing his recently published book "Goudhurst and Kildown at War". Meanwhile over in the Goudhurst Parish Hall, the ladies in charge of the Lunch Club were providing lunch for 30 senior citizens, who then stayed on for a matinee of "Oh What a Lovely War" performed by GADS. There was also an interesting display of WWI memorabilia available to view together with some of the primary school's entries to the Royal British Legion's annual poster competition.





The first service to take place at the Memorial was on Monday 4th August, to coincide with the Declaration of War 100 years previously at 11pm. Again numbers were high with an estimated 150 – 200 people attending. Prayers were led by Revd Hugh Nelson followed by a bugle call to sound “Last Post” at precisely

11pm. Two minutes silence was then observed during which the St. Mary’s church bell was tolled and the lights of Goudhurst were extinguished, leaving just the War Memorial lights illuminated.

The names from the Memorial were then read out by the Chairman of the Goudhurst Royal British Legion and a small wooden cross was laid for each one, the first 12 by relatives of the deceased, many of whom had come from far and wide to attend this special occasion. A final prayer and the singing of the first verse of the National Anthem then completed the ceremony. For a further 1 hour, photos of some of the soldiers from WWI were projected onto the front of the Vine Inn.

It was announced that Goudhurst would fly the Union Flag at half mast on the 100th anniversary of the death of each man and woman, with his or her image projected at dusk onto The Vine, and this would be preceded by a small piece in the Parish Magazine on each one. Thus over the next 5 years Goudhurst would continue in a quiet but meaningful way to pay tribute to their sacrifice.

Grateful thanks are due to each and every one of those who have helped this project through to it’s successful conclusion, not least of course the donors to the Restoration Fund. The media coverage for the weekend shows that Goudhurst had achieved something rather special.

## VILLAGE ECHOES

The exact date of the first church in Goudhurst is not known but it is recorded that there was a church here early in the 12th century when it came under the auspices of Leeds Priory. Eventually, however, a priory was established at Combwell whose monks then acted as chaplains to St Mary's Church in Goudhurst. Records are vague from this time but a past resident of the village, Walter Parry Haskett Smith, listed the names of the vicars from 1210 in the Goudhurst Coronation Book of 1937. First in the list was Benjamin, then William followed by Benjamin de Guherst in 1254. In 1300 Peter the Vicar (the first incumbent to sign himself 'Vicar') made a name for himself by lodging a complaint against the Prior and convent for withholding money due to him from tithes levied in the parish. They also charged him 18d per year for holy oil which he thought was excessive. The case went in his favour, with the result that rights were restored to him and future vicars. It wasn't until 1391, when Thomas Syer was Chaplain, that funding was forthcoming for a vicarage in the village. Until this time Vicars shared Goudhurst duties with their own parish in some cases as far away as Ashford or even Theydon in Essex. This was because the tithes, or earnings, from the parish were insufficient to support a clergyman in his home parish.

After the dissolution of the monasteries during the reign of Henry VIII, St Mary's Church was transferred to the Dean and Chapter of Rochester but responsibility for appointing a Vicar devolved to the Rector who in the case of Goudhurst was a lay person and usually a member of a local landowning family. The Rector kept the income from the tithes out of which he then paid the Vicar a salary. This income was known as the Living and the amount concerned varied wildly from parish to parish depending on its resources. Henry VIII's reign was a period of great turmoil for churches and their priests and in Goudhurst it took a long time to settle down, with a total of eight different incumbents between 1550 and the arrival of William Walter in 1562. He stayed in post until 1589 when the registers of St Mary's record his burial on 21st August that year.

Two more clergymen followed in quick succession before Richard Milbourne arrived in 1612. A Londoner by birth, he had been educated at Winchester College and Queens' College, Cambridge and came to Goudhurst via Sevenoaks and Cheam in Surrey. He was appointed Dean of Rochester in 1611 and chaplain to Henry Frederick, Prince of Wales, the eldest son of James I of England. However his tenure was also short-lived as he resigned from Goudhurst in 1613 and went on to become Bishop of St David's in 1615 and Bishop of Carlisle in 1621.

In 1625 Walter Balcanqual, (alternative spelling Balcanquhall) the son of a Presbyterian minister in Edinburgh, also became Dean of Rochester - the same year he was appointed vicar of St Mary's. After attending university in Edinburgh he went to Pembroke College, Cambridge and by the time he left there in 1616 he had changed his religious allegiance. He spent a short time as chaplain to James I of England before taking up various posts in other parts of the country. He left Goudhurst after only a year. In 1639, he was made Dean of Durham in recognition of his services to the monarchy, and in the same year

he published His Majesty's Large Declaration concerning the Late Tumults in Scotland. On 29 July 1641 for his support of the King against the covenanters in Scotland he was one of those denounced by the Scottish parliament as an 'incendiary'. With the advent of the English Civil War his fortune waned and, forced to flee by the Parliamentarians, he died in Chirk Castle, Denbighshire in 1645.

The English Civil War also caused problems for Daniel Horsmonden, a member of a wealthy family whose property ownership in Goudhurst included Lamberts, in Church Road. Daniel was vicar of St Mary's from 1625 until 1640 as well as being the Rector of Ulcombe from 1627. In 1643 he was one of several clergy in Kent whose Royalist sympathies led to them being forced from their livings and their estates sequestered by the Parliamentarians. He had also been falsely accused of "being a scandalous and malignant priest, a common haunter of ale-houses and taverns and very often exceedingly drunk". As a consequence of these events he was forced to sell a substantial amount of property in order to support himself and his family. His eldest son, Warham, left England during the Civil War for Virginia, America where he held office as a justice in Charles City County for over twenty years before eventually returning to his homeland with the restoration of Charles II.

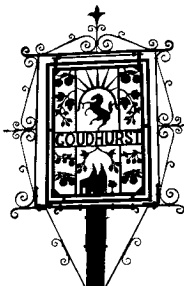
'At the going down of the sun and in the morning we will remember them'

## GOUDHURST PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

At 11.00 on 2nd August the Goudhurst War Memorial, beautifully restored, was duly unveiled with appropriate ceremony by the Deputy Lieutenant for Kent, Colonel Peter Bishop, OBE DL accompanied by the Mayor of Tunbridge Wells Cllr Julian Stanyer, The Rt Hon Greg Clark MP and others. There followed at 23.00 on Monday 4th August a late evening ceremony where crosses were laid as the names of the fifty-nine men and one woman recorded on the memorial were read out. It was all most moving, with an estimated 300 & 200 attending on each occasion (full report elsewhere in the magazine).

As reported last month, the Balcombes Hill Car Park is on the TWBC list of “non-performing assets” for disposal and we are in discussions with them to ensure that this vital Goudhurst facility remains available to the community (alternatively GPC will take steps to acquire it). Following hard on the heels of that announcement, TWBC notified all local parishes of the Discretionary Services which will be withdrawn unless the local communities take on the cost. In this case the continued provision of the public toilets at Balcombes Hill and the regular Sunday civic amenity lorry are under threat. The reason behind these changes is clear; government funding is being withdrawn with funding priority given to more needy areas. However with Borough Council Tax charges simultaneously government capped, there is therefore less money available so choices have to be made. If we are not able to negotiate some relaxation of these changes then we, as a community, will have to decide how much we feel these are essential for our community and if necessary fund them as a parish (estimated to be an extra £5 a year on a Band D Council Tax bill).

U3A (University of the 3rd Age) has been working hard throughout the summer to bring their hopes into reality and our new Goudhurst and District U3A will be formally introduced to our community at an inaugural meeting to be held at Goudhurst Parish Hall at 2.30pm on Wednesday October 22nd. Early indications suggest that there is considerable interest in: Literature, Wine appreciation, Computers and computing, Theatre and cinema, Walking, Photography, Gardening, French, Bridge, Art appreciation, History and Psychology and other topics will be added as interest dictates.
